Hello fellow trail users and to a new season! We have a lot of projects on both properties we are planning for the 2019 season. We have a new entrance sign, orientation signs, kiosks, drinking fountains, trail repairs, and grassland habitat work besides our routine work we have on the docket. Last year we replaced multiple wood and steel culverts on the Red Cedar Trail. This year we will continue to improve water flow under the trail compared to over the trail by cleaning out ditches around those new culverts. We did have one major landslide near mile 12 that got repaired as well as multiple smaller landslides. These slides will also get removed within May and June to alleviate some of the muddy spots on the trail. The good news is that the trails are finally open and are in good condition.

Other good news is as part of the State Parks and Friends Enhancement Project Initiate the Red Cedar Trail will get a new entrance sign at the Depot. We will have 2 new orientation signs on both the Red Cedar and at Hoffman Hills. We will also install 2 new kiosks at Hoffman Hills. We expect to have all the enhancement projects done by June. Expect also to see new drinking fountains installed in the Depot and at Downsville with help from the Friends that received a community grant from Conagra in 2018.

As well as the enhancement projects we are also looking to improve our trails and native habitats at Hoffman Hills. Last year DNR staff met with multiple trail users to mark out a few

new reroutes to improve trail sustainability as well as improving the quality of our trails. You may see quite a few trees marked with red or orange paint going up to the tower and around the south trail as well as within the pine plantations. The trees marked up around the tower will be removed as part of a project to create an access for heavy equipment to get to the tower for future repairs. This is still in the planning phase and we are hoping to save as many trees as we can depending on the size of equipment needed for the tower repairs.



The trees marked along the Squirrel Tail trails will be removed to improve the trails to be more sustainable and safer for cross country skiing. We don't expect the tree removal or trail work around the tower to occur this year, but we are looking for additional feedback from our trail user. This year will give us time to work with contractors to firm up plans for equipment access and we'll have a better idea of how many trees we will need to remove. There will be some forestry work occur this year though within the pine plantations as part improving those stands. We are also planning to improve the prairie area and the wetland areas by removing brush and trees. This will include removing all the trees from around the entrance of the park and north and

west of the park road north to the oak savanna. Our counterparts within the wildlife program are coordinating the habitat work with a whole tree chipping operation that will haul the chips to a biofuel plant. This work is expected to occur within May and June so some trails around the ponds and oak savanna maybe closed while the equipment is operating. This work will really open up the prairie and wetland areas to improve the oak savanna and our grass land habitats. This will continue the work we've done over the course of the last 9 years with the tree plantings, tree shelter maintenance, and brush control. This year on April 26 we had 2 school groups and help from Optimist members and Friends members work on tree shelter maintenance as well as do a spring clean up of the park. We couldn't do all this work without the Friends or our community volunteers. A big thanks goes to all our volunteers, we couldn't do it without you.



Spring wildflowers are really blooming along the trails and still no bugs! At least not yet. Get out and enjoy the trails before they do. If you haven't been to Hoffman Hills lately there is a pair of beavers that moved into the west pond. They built their lodge right next to the bench!

We sell Trail Passes, both Daily and Annual, plus Friends T-shirts & some souvenirs. This will be our third year using "Square" to accept credit card purchases. Our volunteers adjusted to this technology somewhat reluctantly, but they admit we need it. But they say that sometimes the whole shift goes by with no one to talk to. So come visit them to keep them happy! Bring the kids! Fill your water bottles, check the air in your bike tires, ask about trail conditions, see the new displays, and have a terrific Trail summer!

Treasurer's Report

The Friends offer a sincere thank you to the various contributors who help fund the events and projects on the Red Cedar Trail and at Hoffman Hills. We're happy to see new names in all donation categories this year: business memberships, individual memberships and grants. As of May 14, 2019 we've received \$1650 from business memberships -- a 27% increase from last year. The \$195 in individual membership revenue, however, is less than half of last May's total. The decline may be related to the cancellation of the Candlelight Ski, an event that serves to introduce folks to our group and promotes membership. Hopefully the biking/hiking season will usher in a renewed interest in joining our cause!

Our main expenses in 2019 have been T-shirts to sell at the depot (\$399.48), supplies for the Candlelight Ski (\$262.77), insurance (\$351), and a donation toward the purchase of grooming equipment (\$1743). Our general operating balance is currently \$6598.38, the Hoffman Hills & Red Cedar Grooming balance is \$4433.87, and we have \$5000 in the Conagra Brands Grant for total available funds of \$16,032.25.
